“Security Infrastructure Risk Management”

“IT Audit in a Post-Sarbanes-Oxley World”

We all find ourselves at an important point on the road to regaining public trust with our employees and investors. With more than a year into the implementation of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act of 2002 for Section 404, which requires public companies to educate their internal clients, document and review controls' design and practices, perform remediation as required, and develop and perform test controls, including Information Technology (IT) controls, a number of important issues are being discussed at several levels including the Board of Directors, Executive suite, middle management, SEC and PCAOB.

As IT Auditors we all agree that our companies and external auditors discovered that the required effort to become compliance has been extremely difficult, painful, time-consuming, frustrating, costly, value-added versus non-value-added, and many other adjectives that can not be written here.

Several questions come to mind and several are still unanswered:

- Did Sarbanes accomplish what it was intended to do?
- Are the compliance costs out of line with the benefits or are they a reasonable price to pay for stronger internal controls?
- Has the company's resources, including time, materials and efforts, spent on Sarbanes-Oxley 404 compliance diverted from key investment initiatives that could or should have been made?
- Are Boards and also senior management distracted from focusing on growth and ensuring value to it's' shareholders?
- Where does the IT Audit profession go during 2005, with the understanding (1) this is year two for many public companies, (2) there has been a recent postponement for the extension of compliance dates for non-accelerated filers and foreign private issuers regarding Internal Control over financial reporting requirements dated March 2, 2005 and (3) the impact of the PCAOB Release 2005-2009 concerning the Auditing Stand No. 2 dated May 16, 2005.

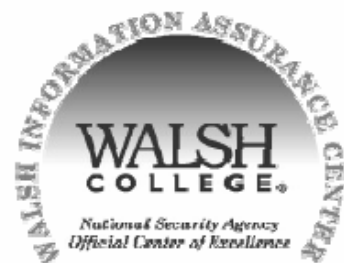

Chapter Spotlight: Interview With Ed Barszcz

Taken from the Global Communiqué – October 2005

Patricia Earl-Cole, current president of the Detroit (Michigan, USA) Chapter, has known Ed Barszcz for nearly 10 years. “I met him right when I started at Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan,” said Earl-Cole. “He invited me to join his lunch crowd.” At that time, Earl-Cole joined ISACA and became involved with the chapter. “I was invited to serve as an honorary board member while I was a student,” she said. Ten years later, Earl-Cole has taken up the role of chapter president.

According to Earl-Cole and other Detroit Chapter officers, it is largely because of Ed Barszcz that the Detroit Chapter has grown from 20 members in 1974 to more than 600 in 2005. “Ed has remained an active member of the board because he looks at the quality of the idea,” said Earl-Cole. “He has the ability to evaluate an idea based on its merits. He also has the rare ability to change with the times, which says a lot for his character.” ISACA International Headquarters asked Barszcz, a long-standing and very active member of the association, a few questions about his career, his volunteer efforts and how a charter chapter member has managed to stay involved with the chapter 30 years after its formation.

Q: When did you first enter the field of IS audit?

A: I started with Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan (BCBSM) in 1971 and retired from there in January of 2004. During my time with BCBSM, I worked in four of the five internal audit departments. During my last three years at BCBSM, I recovered about US \$30 million that had been overpaid to doctors and hospitals. I received acknowledgement for this from BCBSM, and feel it was my experience in finance and IT auditing, as well as working with good staff, that made my job successful.

Q: When did you join ISACA (formerly the EDPAA)?

A: I joined the association in late 1973. After I attended an EDPAA seminar in Chicago with my supervisor, Seymour Ribiat, we gathered information on the association and a group of us decided we needed to start a chapter in our area.

Q: What prompted you to form a chapter in Detroit?

A: There was a lack of good information on how to audit systems, as everyone was new in the field at that time. No one was teaching controls over systems, so we decided to break off from the Institute of Internal Auditors (IIA), which was primarily a financial audit association, and start an ISACA chapter in Detroit. The formation team was quite small, having only six or so individuals on the formation committee. My supervisor (at the time) and I went to a seminar and found out as much as we could about ISACA. At first, we were lucky to have 10 to 15 people attend our meetings, as members from the other audit association were reluctant to attend an ISACA event. Over time, we all learned that we were after the same common goal, and we now hold one or two joint meetings a year with them. Both groups get together in mid-to-late summer to make sure our meeting dates do not overlap for the year, and when we have seminars, they are very successful and we both generate a significant source of revenue for our respective chapters.

Q: Have you served continuously on the Detroit Chapter board?

A: I have been involved on the chapter board in at least some capacity since it formed in 1974, except for several months. I served as chapter president in 1978-79, and have served in every other capacity on the board except that of treasurer. I have helped organize and coordinate our chapter programs and facilities with other groups, such as the IIA and Association of Certified Fraud Examiners. I feel that successful programs are the reason for a successful chapter and a satisfied membership. My main function for many years was to arrange the meeting facilities, menus and program equipment. Our chapter has been fortunate enough to constantly have new people on our board, especially those from the Big 4 CPA firms and the Big 3 auto companies. These companies have helped us find speakers and new members. It can be difficult to find a board member who has time during the day to find a speaker who is willing and able to present for us. The chapter has purchased a projector, computer and portable sound system over the last five years, which has helped significantly with the cost and planning of chapter events.

Q: What are some of the fondest memories you have of the chapter when it first started?

A: About 10 to 15 years ago, we had a meeting and our reservation for the projector fell through at the last minute. I went to K-Mart to buy a new projector and some white sheets that we used for the screen. It was one of those moments when you realize that you just need to make do with what you have.

Q: What advice do you have for those just entering this field of work?

A: You are coming into the field at a good time with all the laws being passed; it is like an insurance plan for auditors. This is the field to get into because there’s a future. Not to mention, there are many, many positions available in the field right now

Q: What can you share with other chapter leaders around the world about the successes behind building a successful ISACA chapter?

A: Perseverance is key. Even if it looks like everything is caving in, do not give up. Make sure you have a good program in place and keep on trying. We are in a field that is needed.

Q: Is there anything else you would like to say to the members of ISACA about the 30-plus years you have spent participating in, volunteering for and dedicating to the association?

A: A long time ago, when I was younger and started the chapter, I had a bit of a speech problem; I was nervous and stuttered and stammered a bit when I spoke. Becoming an officer of the Detroit Chapter helped me overcome my nervousness, change and grow in my profession. It really taught me to not be afraid, and in the working world, I ended up meeting with vice presidents and was able to really accelerate my public speaking skills because of the chapter. I guess what I’m trying to say is that even shy people can do anything if they apply themselves. Several years ago, the Detroit Chapter added an item to its bylaws that allowed Barszcz (and other long-standing board members) to serve multiple consecutive board terms. To thank Ed for his lifelong commitment to the chapter and the IT audit profession, the Detroit Chapter plans to create a “Lifetime Achievement” award in his honor. “One of Ed’s most wonderful traits is that he is helping us on the board because he wants to,” said Earl-Cole. “He always tells me that it is easy to give money to charity but it is a lot more difficult to give of your time and volunteer. Ed has done this for the Detroit Chapter for 30 years now.”

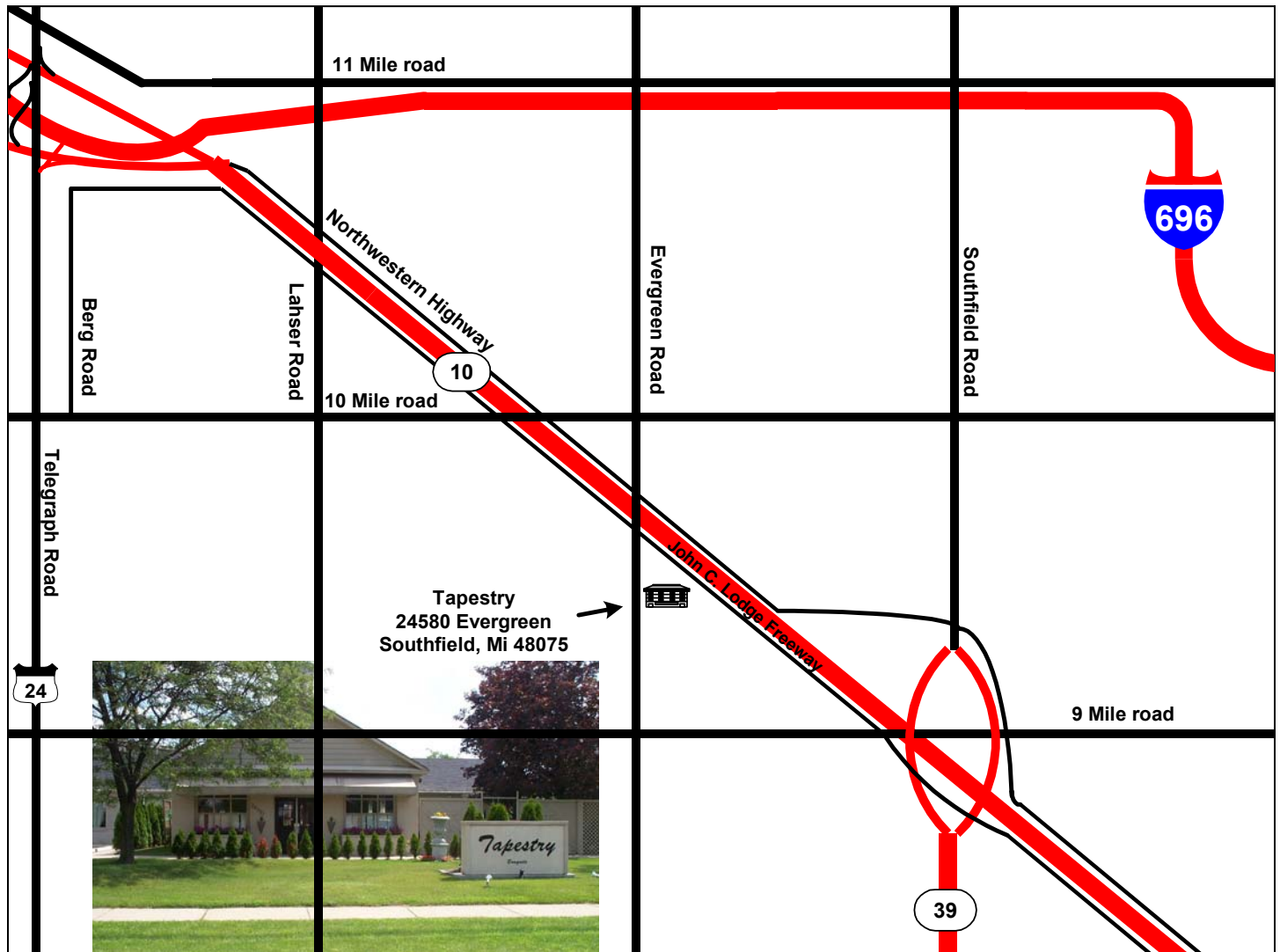

Tapestry is located near major freeways. It is ¼ mile from Highway 10 (the Lodge) and just 1 mile south of I-696 on Evergreen. Tapestry is south of the Speedway Gas station that is located on the SE corner of the Lodge and Evergreen. Tapestry is on the East side of Evergreen Road and is a single story dark beige building. (It was previously a Bill Knapp’s restaurant)

From the Troy Area: Take I-75 South to 696 West. Take 696 West to Exit #11 Evergreen Road. Turn left onto Evergreen Road. Tapestry is just over a mile (1.1) on the left hand side (East side) of Evergreen.

From Detroit: Take The John C. Lodge MI-10 North out of Detroit. Take the Lodge North until the Ten (10) Mile Evergreen Road Exit. Turn left onto Evergreen Road. Evergreen is the first major intersection off of the Lodge. Tapestry Restaurant is only a tenth of a mile on Evergreen on the left hand side (East side).

From Farmington/Novi Area: Take 696 East (Walter P. Reuther) to the John C. Lodge MI 10 South. Follow the John C. Lodge MI 10 for 2 ½ miles to the Evergreen Ten (10) Mile Road Exit. Follow the service drive to Evergreen Road (past 10 Mile Road) and turn Right. Tapestry is less than a tenth of a mile on Evergreen on the left hand side (East side).

From Dearborn/South/Southwest Area: Go to Telegraph Road. Take Telegraph North to Nine (9) Mile Road. Turn right onto Nine Mile to go East. Take Nine Mile for approximately 2 Miles to Evergreen and turn left. Take Evergreen North less than a mile and Tapestry is on your right (East) before 10 Mile Road.
